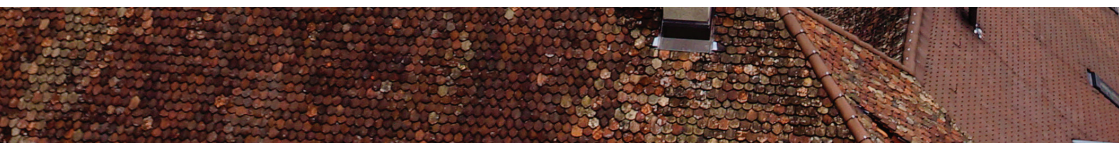


WELCOMING WORDS

It is indisputable that unequal access to healthcare and education during early childhood leads to inequality in skills, accomplishments, health, and general success in adult life.

The Swiss Public Health Conference 2019 delves into these complex connections. On the basis of the lifetime perspective, experts discuss the current state of development in Switzerland and suggest potential solutions. 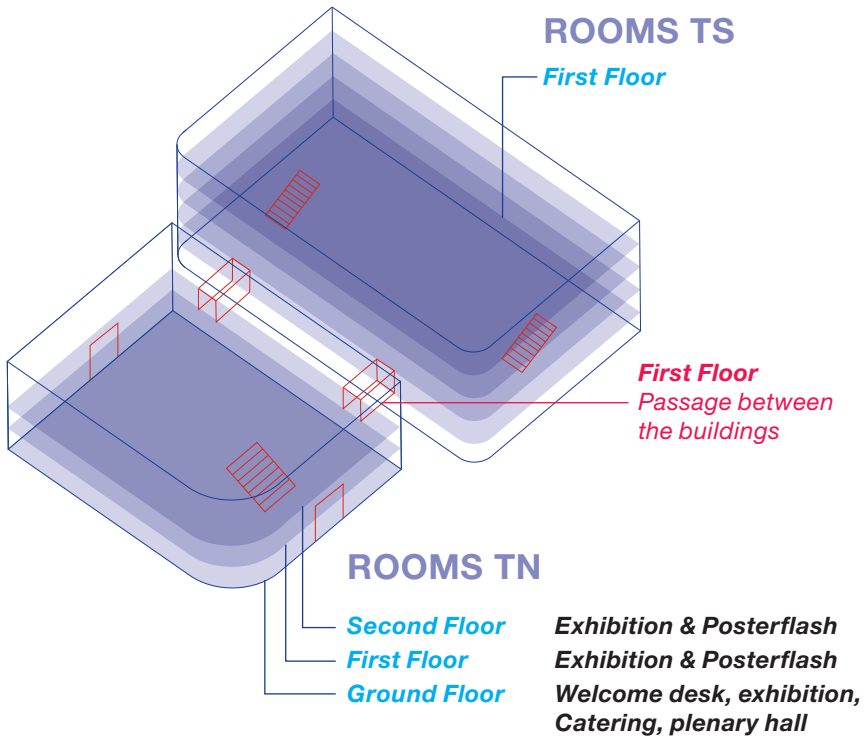

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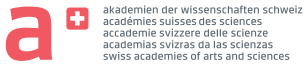

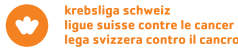
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
